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Rams continue pre-season drills

Offense to play wide-open game

A blessing of nice weather has been bestowed upon the Jefferson football team as they continue drills and await the opening game with Guthrie Center on September 13.

"We're trying to get our offense moving so that we can scrimmage effectively" noted Coach Ray Byrnes. Also, the coaches are eyeing the sophomore members of the squad as possibilities for the defensive line. Byrnes mentioned that with their size, some of these sophomores may be candidates for these positions without hurting the squad.

The Rams plan to play wide open football this season. With members of the backfield learning plays and drilling in several positions, the offense could be full of surprises. The offensive sets have changed quite a bit from last year. Last year the Rams ran a Wing T and Power I series of plays. The throwing game will be quite important for the Rams this season. Jim Faaborg, last year's leading rusher for the Rams, will prove to again be a sound blocker and runner. Faaborg ran for a total of 267 yards on 70 carries last year for an average of 3.8 yards.

As for the kicking and punting squads: Steve Linduska, who last year punted for a total of 1025 yards with an average of 35.4 yards. It appears at this stage of the game, that Dave Carlson and Jack DeWitt will perhaps be doing extra point kicking and kick-offs.

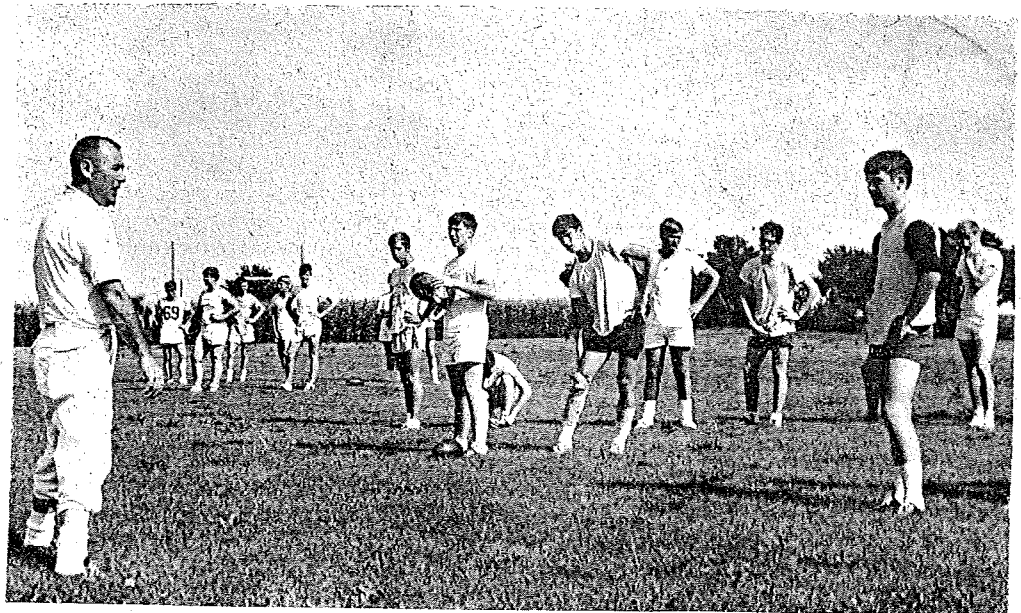
In the backfield, Dan Turner, Dave Carlson and Steve Hastings will be receiving passes and blocking as well as running. Turner was the Rams' second highest rusher last season.

With regard to sophomores, Ray Byrnes mentioned the fact that it appears that they will have enough manpower to make practice "interesting". Also, one player may only play in ten games. This could hinder some sophomores junior varsity play should they play varsity ball.

"Powerful backfield" is Rams' edge

Jefferson will again open its season this year with traditional non-conference rival Guthrie Center. Although outweighed at all positions, Coach Ray Byrnes expects the contest to be a tight one.

The Guthrie Center Tigers will be led by six strong returning starters. Merv Krakau, who plays fullback and tackle, will be playing. The 200-pound Krakau was the baseball team's catcher, a fine shot putter, and a 440 runner. At the halfback spots will be Tom Redfern, who is known for tremendous speed, and Ed Cline. Heading off what is expected to be an improved passing attack will be quarterback Jim Laughery. Returning at tackle will be 215-pound Jim Vandavanter.

The Jefferson line-up will probably consist of Steve Hastings at the left, split end spot. Playing the tight right end will be Steve McPherson. Phil Lautner will be the left tackle with Kim Bates and Dave Lehman still battling it out for the right tackle. Left guard will be played by Bob Zeller with Paul Ogren starting at right guard. Jim Veenstra is eligible for either of those spots. Phil Kennedy is the Rams' center.

Kevin Wand will be calling the plays at quarterback while the backfield is rounded out by Jim Faaborg at left halfback, Steve Linduska at fullback and either Dan Turner or Dave Carlson at right half, depending on field position. Jack DeWitt may see some action in the backfield. Linduska will do the punting; Carlson, the kicking off; and DeWitt or Carlson handling the PATs.

At defensive ends will be Steve McPherson, Kim Bates or Dave Lehman. Lineback spots will be filled by Jim Faaborg, Phil Kennedy and Jeff Razz. Several sophomores in that defensive line may be Francis Luft, Dennis Kennedy and John Shanda. Secondary men on defense will be Dan Turner, Dave Carlson, Jack DeWitt and Steve Hastings.

Coach Byrnes looks at this upcoming game at Guthrie Center as another of the typical games with the Tigers. Guthrie seems to have about their finest team in recent years. This game has always been quite tight. Last year, Jefferson won 13-6 on two touchdowns by Jim Faaborg.

Byrnes described the Rams with a "powerful-type backfield."

Rams give possible starters

Jefferson Head Football Coach Ray, Byrnes announced the possible starters for the Rams' 1968 season. Due to the loss of sophomore quarterback candidate Lou Cardin, Kevin Wand seems the most probable quarterback. Jack DeWitt and Tom Lynch are also in the running.

At center, Phil Kennedy, a senior veteran, and junior Mike Piepel battle for the top spot. The top four competitors for starting spots as guards are seniors Paul Ogren and Bob Zeller, junior Jim Veenstra and sophomore John Shanda.

A search is on for offensive tackles. At present Phil Lautner, Dave Lehman, Jerald Deal, Jim Unger and Kim Bates are possible starters. Steve McPherson, Steve Hastings, Kim Bates and Tom Lane are on top for end spots.

Veterans Dan Turner, Jim Faaborg and Steve Linduska are top for power backs. Also, flanker-back spots seemed to be held by several players: Dave Carlson, Dan Turner, Steve Hastings and Jack DeWitt.

Among sophomores, Coach Byrnes has found several possibilities for defensive line spots: Francis Luft, Dennis Kennedy, John Shanda, and Jeff Razz.

Rams oust Guthrie Center

Tigers' many mistakes aid Ram victory

The supposedly tough Guthrie Center football team fell to the Rams Friday night in a 27-6 decision at Guthrie. The Rams, with a tremendous third quarter, came up with three touchdowns by air and one on the ground. By developing Guthrie's mistakes, the Rams were enabled to score.

Opening the first quarter, Dave Carlson intercepted a Guthrie pass and ran it back five yards. To end the 46 yard march, Jack DeWitt connected with Dave Carlson for an 11 yard touchdown with 8:00 remaining in the first period. Jack DeWitt kicked the PAT.

In the second quarter, Guthrie came up with a score in the opening minute. In their attempt for the extra point, Ram lineman Phil Kennedy got in the way. Then Jefferson was backed up to their 24 yard line and sent in Steve Linduska to punt. The veteran punter booted the ball 74 yards to the two yard line. Within three plays Dave Carlson grabbed the ball on the 13 after a Tiger fumble. Jack DeWitt then drove for two yards and Jim Faaborg for one. Then, following an incomplete pass, the Rams faced a fourth and seven. Jack DeWitt came up with the pigskin and tossed it ten yards for the TD. He then kicked the extra point.

In the first half, Guthrie out did Jefferson for offensive yardage. Guthrie ran for 31 yards and passed one for three for 28 yards. The Rams gained 36 yards rushing and 21 yards passing.

With 6:13 remaining in the third period, Kevin Wand finished up a fifty yard march with a 46 yard pass to Dave Carlson. Jack DeWitt came up with his third PAT of the night. Then with 5:30 left in the third quarter, Dave Carlson intercepted another pass. From the 46, Jim Faaborg landed the ball to the 23; then Steve Linduska ran it to the 10. Two plays later, Linduska ran off tackle for the ten needed yards. DeWitt missed the point.

Also in the third period, Kim Bates stopped a Guthrie Center drive by throwing Tiger back Jim Laughery to a 25 yard loss. This ultimately forced Guthrie to give up the ball. No scoring took place in the final period.

Jim Faaborg led the rushing for Jefferson with 49 yards. Faaborg

ran for only ten in the first half but the second half earned him 39. Steve Linduska came up with 44 yards, 38 of which were in the second half. Other leaders were Jack DeWitt, 18; Dave Carlson, 17 and Kevin Wand, eight.

In the passing department, Kevin Wand connected on two of three. The senior quarterback completed a three yard pass and a 46 yard TD pass. Jack DeWitt completed two also. DeWitt's two complete passes were good for touchdowns, one eight yards and the other one ten. Guthrie went four for seven for 45 yards.

Dave Carlson was responsible for catching three of the four completed passes. He caught the three touchdown passes. Besides the completions, Carlson intercepted two passes and recovered one fumble.

Jack DeWitt was good on three of four PAT attempts and averaged 41 yards on his five kick-offs. Steve Linduska punted seven times for a 44 yard average.

Defensively, the Rams were surprising. Jim Faaborg and Phil Kennedy each came up with eight tackles while Phil Lautner and Jack DeWitt each had seven.

Rams win opener at Guthrie

The Rams won their season opener last Friday night at Guthrie Center. Having been named 18 point underdogs by one source proved ironic as the Rams hustled to a 27-6 victory over the Tigers.

The Rams scored their first touchdown after Dave Carlson intercepted a Tiger pass and began the 46 yard march. Jack DeWitt then connected with Carlson for an eight yard TD.

In the second quarter, Guthrie scored on a 28 yard pass play. Then with 4:10 left in the period Jack DeWitt threw a 10 yard pass right into the arms of Dave Carlson to make the score 14-6.

In the second half the Rams really got hot. With 6:13 left in the third, Kevin Wand combined with Dave Carlson for a 46 yard touchdown pass. Then with 5:39 left, Dave Carlson intercepted his second pass. Then Jim Faaborg and Steve Linduska combined to take the ball from the 45 to the 10. With 4:00 left in the third period Linduska took the ball in.

Jim Faaborg and Phil Kennedy led the Rams defensively with eight tackles each. Jack DeWitt and Phil Lautner each had seven.

In the first half, Guthrie moved the ball 31 yards, 32 of which were in the first quarter. In the second half the Tigers gained 23 yards rushing. As for the Rams, 136 yards of rushing was gained, 100 yards of it in the second half.

The Rams face Audubon next Friday at the Jefferson field.

Jefferson to host Audubon Friday

"Good chance for upset" says Byrnes

After the 27-6 defeat of Guthrie Center last weekend, Jefferson has one victory under their belts and is hungry for another. However, Audubon will be a much larger and more experienced team than the Tigers.

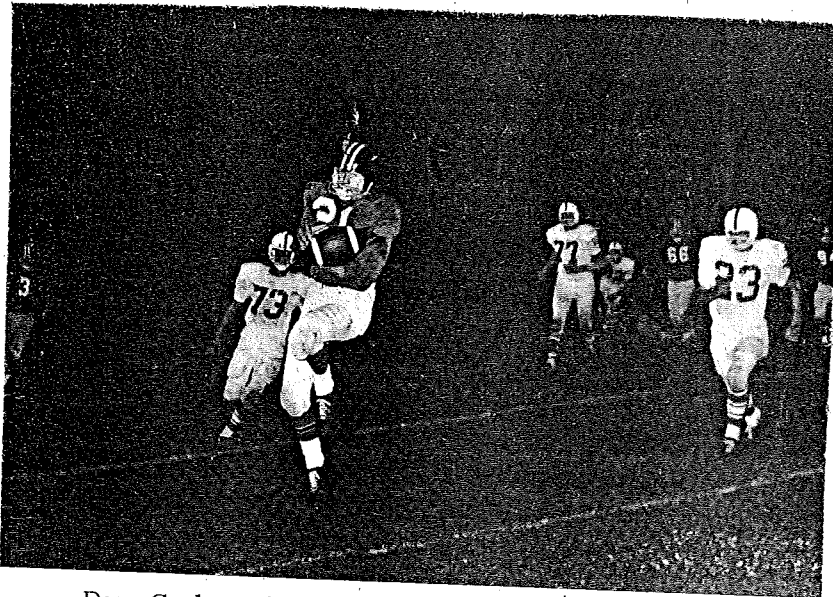
In keeping with their past precedents, the Wheelers are a smooth functioning squad. Last week, in their opener, the Wheelers were downed 8-6 by Storm Lake. Storm Lake scored the winning points on a safety after Audubon had made a goal line stand and took the ball over on the one or two.

Among the ten returning letter winners are: at quarterback Martin Sprock; the 155-pound junior is tops in punting and passing. One of his top receivers is right halfback Tom Rasmussen, a 150-pound senior. Rasmussen is a fine pass receiver and a fast runner, especially on the outside sweeps. 167-pound Randy Kraual will be holding the fullback spot. Kraual is strong on inside running, especially off tackle. At left halfback is Dave Campbell, a 166-pound senior. All the backs are lettermen except Campbell.

Audubon uses a rushing, "pro-type" defense. By "pro-type", Coach Byrnes meant few in front and multiple linebackers. Their offense is usually a Wing T with a slot and sometimes they run from an I formation.

Jefferson will be with the services of back Dan Turner once again. Turner was taken out of action early last week with an injury.

The Rams have been working on unit defense with more men playing. With the modifications in the defense, there are several spots up for grabs. "We're trying for an offense that can handle any defense they can hand out" remarked Coach Byrnes. He added, "There has been good attitude this week. There is a good chance for an upset."

The Jefferson Rams opened their home football season on a dismal note last Friday night. They fell at the hands of the Audubon Wheelers by the score of 27-14.

Jefferson was the first team to score. Kevin Wand threw a 40 yard touchdown pass to Dave Carlson, and Jack Dewitt added the extra point to make it 7-0, Jefferson, with 2:33 left in the first quarter.

With 4:51 left in the second quarter, Audubon scored as Martin Sprock, Audubon's quarterback, hit Neil Bro with a 15 yard touchdown pass. The PAT was good, which tied up the game 7-7. The score was the same as the first half ended.

In the second half Audubon

scored first when Jim Kerwin ran back a punt 57 yards for six points. The extra point was no good and with 7:20 left in the third period, the Wheelers led 13-7.

The Rams then started to march downfield after receiving Audubon's kickoff. They marched down to the 2 yard line where Jack DeWitt was stopped short of a touchdown on 4th down.

Audubon halfbacks, Krueel and Campbell, added two fourth period touchdowns on runs of 1 and 55 yards respectively. Both PATS were good and the Wheelers led 27 to 7.

Jefferson's last score came with 50 seconds left in the game as Tom Lynch hit flanker back Steve Hastings with a 21 yard touchdown pass. The extra point was good and the game ended shortly after with Audubon on top 27 to 14.

Wheelers jump past Rams

27-14

Two final period TD's fall Rams

Three second half touchdowns stumped the Rams last Friday night as the Audubon Wheelers walked away with a 27-14 victory. Jefferson and Audubon were locked in a 7-7 tie at the end of the first half.

Jefferson, winning the toss, chose to receive. After four downs, Steve Linduska punted 58 yards to the two yard line. The Wheelers returned the ball to the 11 and were forced to punt. Jefferson took possession and exchanged after four downs. After a 38 yard drive Ram lineman Phil Kennedy grabbed an Audubon fumble on the 37. After a series of six plays and three first downs, all by Jim Faaborg, Kevin Wand threw a 41 yard touchdown pass to Dave Carlson. Jack DeWitt was good on the PAT. Carlson followed soon with a pass interception regaining control of the ball for Jefferson; he ran the ball from the 44 to the 22. Faaborg then went for two yards, Wand passed 5 yards to Carlson, Wand passed two yards to Steve Hastings. Then with fourth and two on the 13, the Rams died.

Opening the second quarter of competition, Audubon held possession. The ball exchanged and on third down, Jack DeWitt threw a 13 yard pass play to Dave Carlson. With the exchange of the punt, Audubon began a drive from their own 20 to the 14. Then, with 4:51 left in the first half Martin Sprock dropped a 14 yard pass into the hands of Neil Bro. The extra point was good. So the half ended in a 7-7 tie.

In the first half, Audubon outrushed Jefferson 62 yards to 23. In total offensive yardage, Audubon went for 120 yards while the Rams were good for only 84 yards. Audubon doubled the Rams' first downs with eight.

In third quarter action, Audubon took the kickoff on the 14 and ran it to the 41. After a series of twelve plays, the Rams took over on the 23. After three plays and only a yard gain, Steve Linduska punted. Jim Kerwin took the ball and ran it back 61 yards for Audubon's second TD. The score then stood 13-7. Jefferson took the kickoff and ran it to the 41. After three first downs, the Rams held ground on the ten yard line with first down. Jack DeWitt took the ball five yards. Then with second and five on the five, DeWitt lost his footing along with a yard. DeWitt threw an incomplete pass on third down. With fourth and five to go, DeWitt tried desperately to make the ground but fell a yard short. The third quarter ended with the score 13-6 with the Wheelers in possession of the ball.

With 9:40 remaining in the contest, Jim Faaborg intercepted a Wheeler pass but lost his footing. He appeared to be wide open at the time. After a five play series, Audubon took over on the 35. On second down, Dave Campbell went 62 yards off tackle. The extra point bounced over the bar to make the score 20-7. Audubon followed with a pass interception and a score on a one yard plunge by Randy Krauel. Jefferson then took possession and was forced to punt. Phil Lautner grabbed a fumble and gave the Rams the ball on the 21. With :49 left, Tom Lynch came in to pass 21 yards to split end Steve Hastings. DeWitt kicked the PAT and the game ended 27-14.

Jim Faaborg led the Rams with 42 yards rushing while Jack DeWitt followed close behind with 40 yards. With a 127 yard fourth rushing quarter, the Wheelers totaled 219 yards. Jefferson passed for 143 yards and gained 80 yards rushing.

Defensively, Steve McPherson came up with a fantastic 22 tackles. Phil Lautner had ten; Dave Lehman, eight; Phil Kennedy, eight; and Bob Zeller, eight.

Rams will travel to Harlan

Need less mistakes for upset

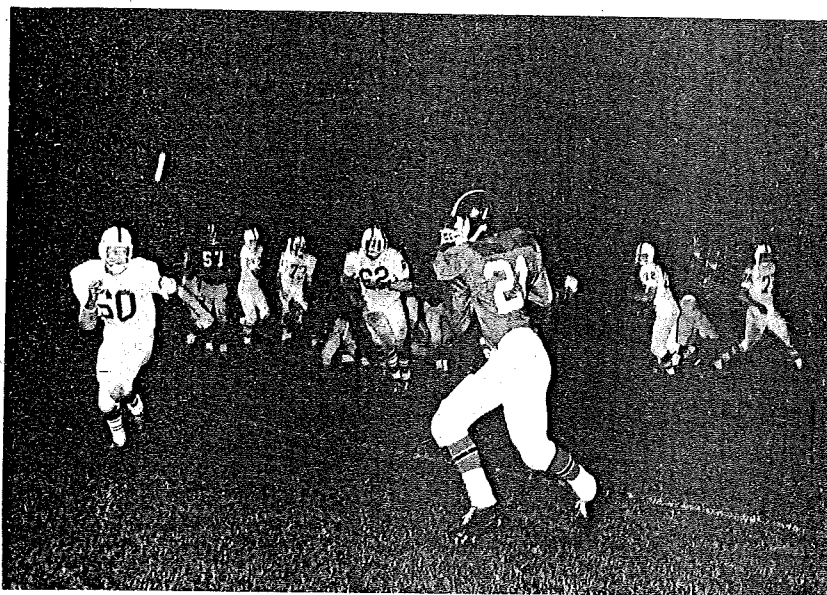
Jefferson has been polishing kicking, blocking and pass defense in an attempt to iron out mistakes made in the Audubon Wheeler game in anticipation of the Harlan Cyclones. Coach Byrnes remarked "We can't make mistakes and win ball games!"

Harlan, who downed the Rams last year 13-0, was beaten last week by Denison 6-0. The Cyclones boast physical strength and speed as their advantages while the Rams will be going on "courage, guts and fire" says Coach Ray Byrnes.

Starting at quarterback for Harlan will be 155-pound junior Phil Larsen. At fullback will be Randy Rasmussen, a 165-pound senior. Holding halfback spots are Bob Rust, 155-pound junior, and Randy Pasch, a 145-pound junior. Roger Beck, 195-pound senior, will be featured at end and back. At the other end will be Gary Lansman, a 175-pound junior, who doubles at wingback. The Cyclones boast three middle linemen at between 195 and 215 pounds.

Harlan runs an "I" type offensive formation with a split end and wingback with lots of sweeping and passing. Larsen's favorite targets are Boeck and Lansman. However, Harlan is usually considered stronger defensively. They will use the platoon system and change the entire team.

For the Rams this should prove to be the toughest road trip. Both teams were beaten last week and will be up for victory. Realizing that the Rams are two to three touchdown underdogs, Coach Byrnes noted game strategy as "courage and fire versus strength, and hope for an upset."

Rams pull upset over Harlan 20-14

The Jefferson Rams traveled to Harlan last Friday night and upset the Cyclones 20-14, also spilling their homecoming.

In the first quarter, after an exchange of punts, the Rams had the ball on the Harlan 47-yard line, first and ten. On the third play of the series Jack DeWitt, Ram tailback, circled his left end for a 42 yard scoring jaunt. DeWitt added the extra point and with 7:02 left in the first quarter, the Rams were ahead 7-0.

Jefferson kicked off, and Harlan began a 70 yard scoring drive with the Cyclone quarterback, Phil Larsen eventually going over from the one for 6 points. The PAT was good and score was tied with three minutes left in the first quarter.

A short time into the second period, Dan Turner intercepted a Harlan pass on the Cyclones twenty-nine yard line. Seven plays later, the Rams scored as Kevin Wand hit Steve Linduska with a thirteen yard touchdown pass. The PAT was good, and Jefferson led 14 to 7 with 10:09 remaining in the second period.

After Steve McPherson intercepted a batted Cyclone pass on

the Harlan 45 yard line on Harlan's next drive, the Rams marched for a touchdown with Wand going over from the five yard line. The extra point was no good and the first half ended 5:02 later with the Rams ahead 20-7.

The only score of the second half came after the Cyclones had held Jefferson to downs on the Ram 38-yard line late in the 3rd period. Harlan scored shortly after as Larsen hit halfback Rich Bruck with a 9 yard scoring pass. The PAT was good and the Rams remained on top to the end of the ballgame 20 to 14.

Jefferson entertains the Monarchs of Denison in the Rams homecoming tilt next Friday night.

Rams upset Cyclones

20-14

"Responsible defense" is key factor

What most fans would call an upset, and indeed it was, was termed otherwise by Jefferson's coach Ray Byrnes as the Rams swept past defending conference champions, the Harlan Cyclones 20-14. Byrnes said "It wasn't actually an upset, we were the better ball team on the field." But better ball team or not, the 14 point pre-game underdogs, Jefferson, played an excellent combination of effort and determination.

On the opening kickoff, Jim Faaborg handed to Steve Hastings who almost broke free on the reverse. Hastings ran the ball to the Harlan 45 yard line. Harlan took over the ball and after two losses inflicted by Ram Kim Bates, the Cyclones were forced to punt with fourth down, 14 yards to go. The Rams took over on the Harlan 46. With third and six Jack DeWitt turned it on for a 42 yard end sweep. DeWitt's PAT was good to make the score 7-0 with 7:02 left in the first period.

Harlan took the kickoff on the 30 and began a 70 yard drive. Phil Larsen soon took the ball to the Jefferson 42 with a 23 yard carry. After a series of nine plays, Phil Larsen took the ball in from the one and kicked the point after. Jefferson took the ball on the 37 but was unable to make headway. Linduska kicked and Harlan soon followed with punt. The ball again changed hands and the Cyclones held the ball on the Rams' 28 as the first period ended.

Opening the second period, Dan Turner intercepted Phil Larsen's pass and ran it to the 29. Faced with fourth and seven, the Rams chose to gamble. Jack DeWitt connected with Jim Faaborg on a screen pass for 12 yards. DeWitt took the first down play for one yard. Kevin Wand finished the drive with a 13 yard touchdown pass to Steve Linduska. Jack DeWitt made the extra point to make the score 14-7 with 10:09 left in the second quarter.

Harlan took the ball and with the aid of a violation moved the ball to the Jefferson 40. The Cyclones grabbed a first down but after two key losses, one nine yard loss inflicted by Dave Lehman, was faced with third and 20. On the following play, Phil Larsen bobbled the ball and Steve McPherson grabbed an interception. After a series of seven plays Kevin Wand swept five yards to score for Jefferson with about five minutes left in the half. The kick was no good and the score stood

20-7. The ball changed hands and Randy Rassmussen grabbed a Ram pass; and Harlan again threatened. With 20 seconds left in the half, the Ram defense made a dynamic stand on their own five yard line and the half

ended 20-14.

In the first period Harlan grabbed 45 yards on the ground. The Rams, however, held the Cyclones to two yards in the second period. Jefferson gained 70 yards rushing in the first

half.

Opening the second half Harlan was forced to kick and Jefferson took the ball on their own 19. Harlan then forced the Rams to kick. Harlan then started a 38 yard drive which ended when Phil Larsen passed nine yards to Rick Bruck. The PAT was good.

From then on it was a scoreless battle. Harlan was constantly threatening to score. With 2:05 left of play Jack DeWitt intercepted a pass. Faced with fourth down, the Rams chose to punt. Steve Linduska came on to put the Cyclones in the hole with a 64 yard punt. Harlan, in desperation began a long pass attack. Dave Lehman managed to penetrate the Harlan line to pressure Phil Larsen. The hurried pass fell into the hands of Dave Carlson with 11 seconds left.

Jack DeWitt led the Ram offense with 64 yards rushing. Jim Faaborg and Kevin Wand followed with 29 and 27 yards respectively. Jefferson completed six passes for 63 yards and gained 118 yards on the ground. Harlan had 88 yards rushing and passed for 69 yards.

Because of Harlan's attempt to find a weakness in Jefferson's line by probing, the tackling was quite even. Steve McPherson led with ten. Phil Lautner and Steve Hastings had eight; Dave Lehman and Jim Faaborg had seven while Dan Turner, Kim Bates and Dave Carlson had six.

This game should rate as one of the most exciting in the history of JCHS. No one dared claim either team winner until Dave Carlson intercepted the Harlan pass with :11 left. Under the leadership of co-captains Dave Carlson and Steve McPherson

122 yards rushing for Jack DeWitt

Jefferson once again showed their strength by upsetting the top-rated team in the Midwest Conference last Friday night. The Rams outrushed the Monarchs of Denison over four times as they pushed to a 26-0 homecoming victory.

Denison took the kickoff and ran it to the 38. On three carries, Craig Johnson gained 17 yards rushing and was then hurt. The Monarch star was sidelined until the final part of the fourth period. Finishing another four plays, Jon Harvey took punt position and booted the ball -1 yard.

The Rams took the ball and exchanged it after seven plays. Denison took the ball on the 12 and soon found themselves faced with fourth and 12. Harvey punted to the 44 and Dan Turner returned the kick nine yards. Jefferson faced fourth down and four. Steve Linduska went into punt position and attempted a pass. The pass was incomplete but pass interference was called. With first down on the 15, Jack DeWitt went for one yard. Kevin Wand followed on second down by passing to Steve Linduska on the five. Linduska caught the pass only to have it jarred from his hands and recovered by Denison on the five. Denison punted and the first quarter ended.

The Rams held possession opening the second period but soon faced fourth and 22. Linduska punted and Denison held the ball for only four downs. Harvey punted and Dan Turner came up with a 27 yard return to the Monarchs' 23. Jack DeWitt went nine on first down, followed by Jim Faaborg going four. With first down, Jack DeWitt scrambled around right end for five yards putting the Rams on the five. With 8:00 left in the second period, Kevin Wand pitched to DeWitt around left end. DeWitt broke two tackles and scored. The conversion was good making the score 7-0.

Denison took the kickoff but gave the Rams the ball after four downs. With first down on their own 20, the Rams featured Jim Faaborg going six yards and two yards respectively. Wand then picked up the first down by going seven yards on the keeper. Jim Faaborg and Jack DeWitt then combined attacks for nine yard gain. Then with third and one to go, Kevin Wand pitched to Jack DeWitt who went around left end and cut to the right. Faking and cutting tremendously, he went 58 yards to make the score 13-0. The PAT was no good.

Taking the kickoff, Denison began their longest drive of the night. In nine plays the Rams found themselves backed up to the four yard line. Denison's quarterback, Dick Neumann, faced with fourth and goal, decided on a keeper. Dan Turner and Steve McPherson were on hand to stop him at the two. So with 59 seconds remaining in the half, Jefferson took over and ran out the clock.

The third quarter didn't feature much except punt exchanges until with 2:12 left, Dave Carlson picked off a Neumann pass on the Ram 45. After two first downs and with :41 left in the period Jack DeWitt threw the bomb of the night. It was estimated that he threw the ball 55 yards in the air on the 46 yard touchdown pass to Steve Hastings. The extra point was no good and Jefferson led 19-0.

Denison opened the fourth quarter with a 32 yard punt. The ball exchanged hands twice and Jefferson held possession on their own 41. Following four first downs, the Rams were faced with fourth and 11 on the 14. A pass meant for Steve Hastings was broken up in the end zone by Dick Neumann. Denison took over and on the first play Hastings got his revenge. Hastings intercepted Neumann's pass and scampered 17 yards to the 19. After several plays the Rams suffered from a 15 yard penalty and faced third and 20. Jefferson threw an incomplete pass but gained a 15 yard penalty for roughing the passer. With third and five, and 1:34 left on the clock, Jack DeWitt passed to Dave Carlson, who lunged across the line to score on the 13 yard play. DeWitt made the extra point to make the score 26-0. The reserves played the remainder of the contest as the Monarchs tried fruitlessly to score.

Jack DeWitt emerged as the game's leader. Not only did he have a hand in all four touchdowns, but he came up with 122 yards rushing and 73 yards passing. He moved the ball 92 rushing yards in the first half. Jim Faaborg also played a fine ground game with 93 yards rushing. His longest jaunt was 38 yards but his constant pounding at the Monarch line for four and five yard gains grabbed the Rams many first downs. Faaborg averaged over four yards a carry and was thrown for only one loss.

The Rams totaled 232 yards rushing and 88 yards passing for an offensive total of 320 yards. Denison moved the ball only 52 yards on the ground but passed for 128 yards for a 180 yard total. Jefferson gained 13 first downs as compared to the Monarch's six.

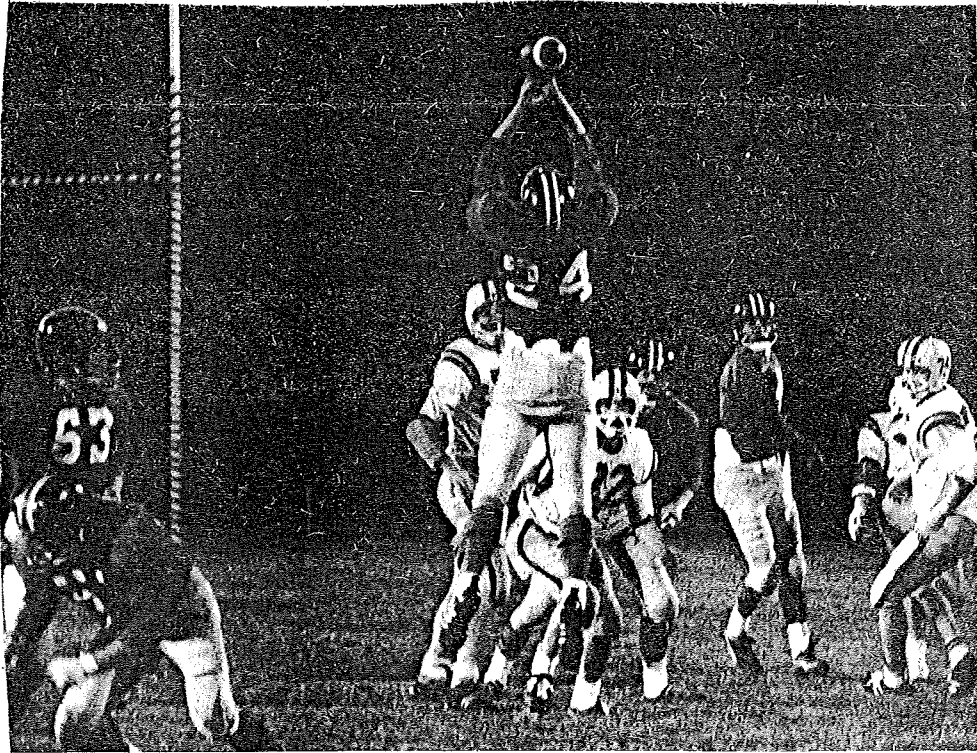
Leading tacklers for the Rams were Dave Lehman, Steve McPherson and Steve Hastings. Each had nine tackles. Dave Carlson had seven.

Coach Byrnes called the vic-

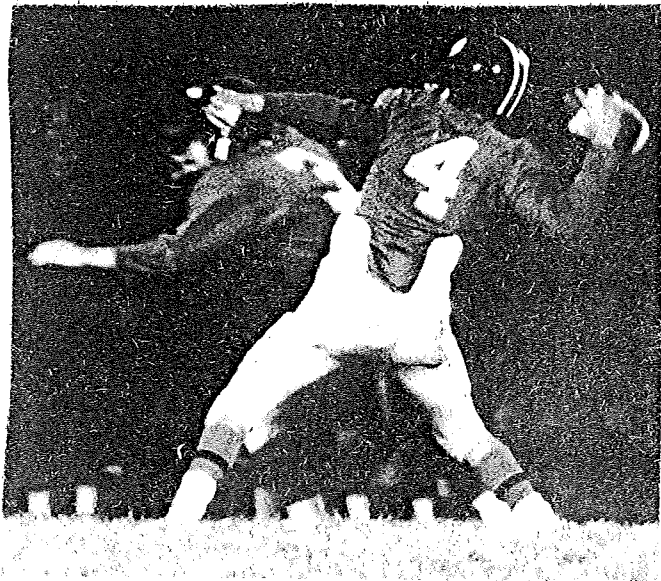

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Jeff. wallops Denison 26-0

The Jefferson Rams successfully employed the services of quarterback Jack DeWitt and shifty halfback Jim Faaborg to earn themselves a prized 26-0 victory over the Denison Monarchs in the Jefferson homecoming game. This is the second time this year that the hapless Monarchs have been, shall we say, skunked.

The Monarchs, who were picked by many authoritative sources to gain the Midwestern Conference title, again could not seem to turn all of that speed we have been hearing about into points on the scoreboard. They were blanked 19-0 at Atlantic and had some difficulty defeating Harlan 6-0 on home territory. At Perry last week, the Monarchs and Bluejays battled to a 6-6 tie. The Monarchs have scored 12 points to their opponents 51.

The Jefferson game was an embarrassing one for Denison. Fans who made the trip expected a victory from the highly regarded Monarchs who showed no evidence of being championship material.

Jefferson threatened early after a series of Denison plays which ended with a Jon Harvey punt which sailed straight into the air and netted a minus one yard. The Rams capitalized on the mistake and pushed to the Denison 49 yard line. They were forced to punt but soon had control of the ball again. Their offensive in high gear, the Rams drove to the 15. At this point, quarterback Kevin Wand passed to fullback Linduska who fumbled the ball on the five yard

line into the hands of Dick Neumann. The Monarchs were forced to kick as they could not move the ball from deep position. The Rams moved the ball again but were caused to punt to the Monarchs who soon kicked the ball back again. Jefferson, using a favorite DeWitt to Faaborg pitch - out moved the pigskin to the five yardline of the Monarchs. A DeWitt to Faaborg pitch - out at this point gave Jeff a touchdown. The PAT attempt was successful. Jefferson scored again on the same type of play after Denison could not move the football. DeWitt carried the ball over after a pitch - out to him by Wand.

Jefferson kicked off to the Denison team and well planned passing and rushing brought the Monarchs to the six of their opponent. Neumann kept the ball, fumbled, picked it up and was stopped cold on the two on fourth down. Thus ended Denison's only serious threat of the game with 56 seconds left in the first half.

For much of the first and second half the Monarchs were without the services of speedster Craig Johnson who was sidelined for what appeared to be an ankle injury. He was sent back into the game periodically by Coach Vogelmann but it was in vain because the Rams were persistent intentionally aggravating the injury, gnashing the star in any manner they saw fit.

The second half was much a repeat of the first half, which is to say, dismal. Jefferson scored two more times, both on passes. DeWitt threw the bomb to halfback Steve Hastings for one TD. The

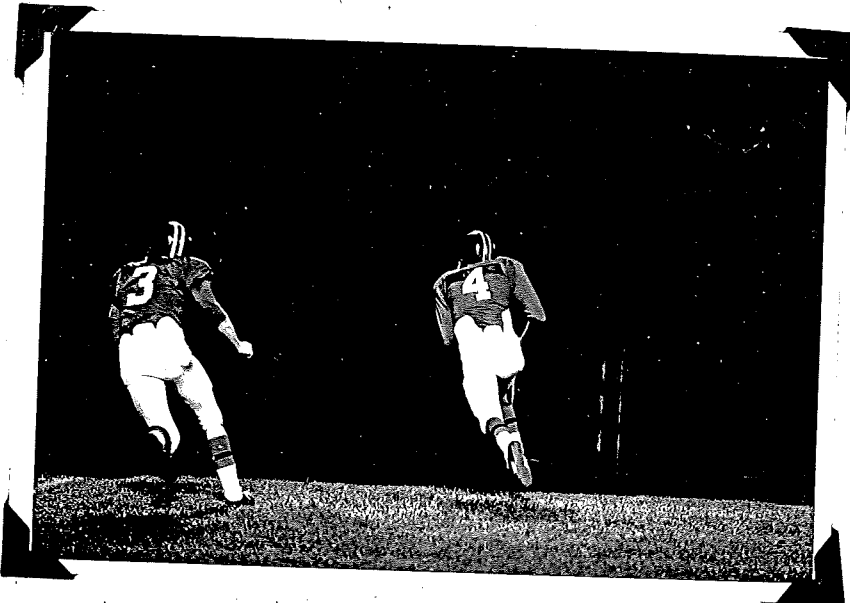
pass was 55 yards in the air and Hastings was all alone in the end zone. It was the kind of pass Denison fans have been waiting for all season. The trouble is, it is the opponents who are completing them, not the Monarchs.

With only a minute and a half left, Jeff scored the final tally of the game on a 15 yard pass to Carlson. The extra point attempt was successful giving them a decisive 26-0 victory.

All the while the Monarchs were attempting to defend themselves from the Rams and occasionally they even managed to put together something which vaguely resembled an offense. Once they completed a pass to Dick Neumann for good yardage to give loyal fans a thrill. They tried to hit Harvey in a fluster of passes but he wasn't there.

So it went with the Monarchs at Jefferson. It can be assumed that they will look better next Friday evening. They had better. Conference champs never lose their homecoming.

On the following play, Jefferson was charged with clipping and penalized 15 yards. After another four yard loss, Jefferson passed only to have Perry's Ron Pennington intercept it. Perry pulled a quick kick and Jefferson took the ball on the 30. The ball exchanged hands and the half ended.

Opening the third period, Perry took the kickoff. After several plays, Steve McPherson recovered a fumble on the Perry 44. Turner gained yardage of 13 yards on the next two plays to gain a first down. Turner went four and two yards respectively on the next two plays. Steve Linduska went six yards followed by Kevin Wand going one. Dan Turner went three yards on second down, which was lost on the next play. Faced with fourth and nine on the 30, Jefferson threw an incomplete pass and Perry took possession. The Bluejays had moved the ball to the Rams' 37 yard line when the third period ended.

Opening the fourth period, Perry swept the ball to the 29. After three plays, Bluejay quarterback Dean Rector passes to Jeff Wilson for 30 yards. Perry moved to the 11 and faced fourth and three. On the key play of the game, Dean Rector rounded the end and met Dave Carlson at the 10. Jefferson took possession with 7:50 left to play.

Jefferson steadily moved the ball on the ground trying to use up the clock. Jefferson suffered from two penalties and soon faced third and second. Dan Turner, who took the place of injured Jim Faaborg for a good part of the game, came through with a 24 yard run to save the Rams. Turner, Linduska, and DeWitt continued to hound the Perry line and ran out the clock.

Dan Turner did an excellent job after Jim Faaborg was taken from the game. Turner rushed for 90 yards, averaging four yards a carry. Jack DeWitt had 46 yards rushing and Kevin Wand followed with 38. Steve Linduska had 26 yards while Jim Faaborg had 12. Jefferson's total offensive yardage broke down to 192 yards rushing and 15 yards passing. Perry had 112 yards rushing and 30 yards passing. Jefferson gained 15 first downs while Perry had eight.

Leading the Jefferson defense was Phil Lautner, a senior lineman. Lautner grabbed 12 tackles while Steve Linduska and Steve Hastings had nine.

The game was a hard hitting contest for both teams. The defensive units were responsible for the three fumbles and hard tackles.

'Team effort' rushes for 223 yards

Jefferson racked up 171 yards rushing during the first half of a great team game last Friday night as the Rams swept past the Carroll Tigers 19-0. Although scoreless at the end of the first period, Jefferson developed a scoring attack that netted 290 offensive yards.

Carroll took the kickoff and worked their way to the Ram 26 yard line. The Rams took over and were penalized for illegal procedure on first down. Facing first and 15, Steve Linduska barreled four yards. After a four yard loss on second down, Dan Turner gained four yards. Steve Linduska got off a 37 yard punt. Carroll took five plays to punt and the Rams took possession on their own four yard line. On the first down call, Steve Linduska took the ball 24 yards. Dan Turner followed with a 12 yard burst and a four yard run. On second down, Dave Carlson took the ball 10 yards to the 45. With first down, Linduska went three yards followed by five yards by Dave Carlson. Dan Turner lost three yards and the Rams faced fourth and five. With an incomplete pass on first down, the Tigers couldn't gain ground. They punted and Jefferson took over on the 21. Steve Linduska went four yards to open the series. Kevin Wand followed with a seven yard gain with a keeper. Dan Turner edged the ball another yard and Wand grabbed gains of seven and one yards. Faced with fourth and one, quarterback Wand followed center Phil Kennedy to a first down by inches, on a sneak. On first down Dan Turner was thrown for a six yard loss. After no gain by Jack DeWitt, Turner came back with a five yard gain. With fourth and 11, Linduska punted 42 yards and Mickey Everett ran back eight yards to the 26. Carroll gained a first down on the third play as Al Ringleb threw to Steve Heuton for a 33 yard gain. On the following third down, fullback Roger Fuller fumbled and Phil Lautner recovered to give the Rams possession on the 38. The Rams ran the clock

out.

On the opening kickoff of the second half, Steve Hastings took the ball from Dan Turner and ran it 31 yards to the 46. Turner lost a yard on first down but followed with a seven yard gain. Dave Carlson was then stopped for no gain. With third down, Jack DeWitt went back and threw to Dave Carlson who broke two tackles and scored on a 27 yard combination. The extra point was good and the score stood 13-0. Jefferson kicked off and after three plays Carroll faced fourth and one. Dave Carlson was on hand to throw the Tigers for a two yard loss. Jack DeWitt went 16 yards to the 34 on the opening play. Following an incomplete pass, DeWitt threw six yards to Steve Linduska. 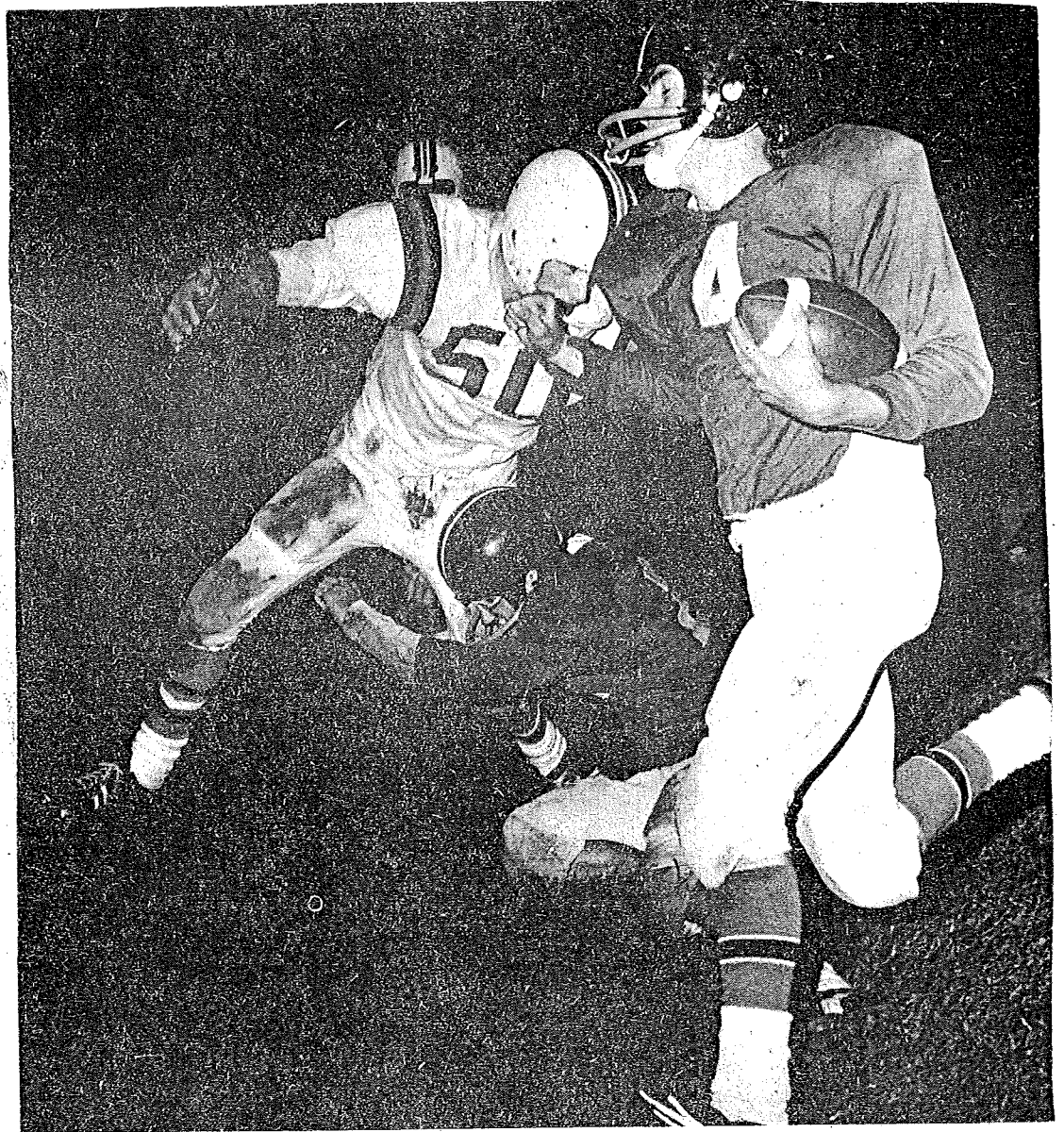

Facing third and nine, Kevin Wand threw to Dave Carlson who ran beautifully for a 23 yard gain. With 7:10 left, Wand threw to Jack DeWitt who made up the 13 yard distance to the goal with a jaunt filled with twisting allusions of tacklers. The extra point was no good and the score was 32-6.

Jefferson kicked off and Lake City moved within scoring range. On a fourth down pass, Jack DeWitt caught receiver Rusty Meinen in the air nearly splitting the Lake City end in half on the seven yard gain. Three plays later, when the Eagles threatened to score, Jack DeWitt stepped in front of the intended Eagle receiver and picked off one of Redenius' passes on

the 17. Jefferson ran four plays and the game ended.

Jefferson's rushing mounted up 164 yards while the passing attack netted 160 yards. Lake City's rushing amounted to 67 yards, with 10 in the third quarter and -1 in the fourth, and the passing game to 118.

The Jefferson offensive unit was led by Dave Carlson. The senior halfback rushed 62 yards and caught 103 yards worth of passes. Incidentally, Carlson's kicking was excellent for the night.

Dan Turner showed eager incentive with great second efforts good for extra yards. Turner's running netted 37 yards while he received 44 yards of passing. Other top rushers for Jefferson were Jack DeWitt with 26 and Steve Linduska with 25.

Jefferson's offensive unit clearly played their finest game of the season. On defense, Steve McPherson did a marvelous job backing up the line. Kim Bates and Dave Lehman proved their ability as defensive ends. Steve Hastings did a great job offensively and defensively. Steve McPherson led the defense with 14 tackles while Dan Turner had 12.

With Audubon's loss to Harlan, the Rams are now tied for first place in the Midwest Conference. In order to gain the crown, the Rams must win next week against Sac City and Audubon fall at the hands of Denison.

Sac nets -6 yards rushing against rams

The Jefferson Rams did their best to take the Midwest Conference Championship last Friday night but had to settle for a tie with the AudubonWheeler. Jefferson came through with a 31-0 trouncing of the Sac City Indians at Sac City.

Jefferson received the kickoff and Steve Hastings came up with a 24 yard return. Facing first and ten on the 45, Dan Turner pulled for a six yard gain. Dave Carlson gained another two yards and Dan Turner grabbed the first down with a five yard jaunt. Linduska and Carlson came up with five and three yard gains respectively. Facing third and two, Jack DeWitt combined with Dave Carlson to begin the Rams' aerial attack. Carlson grabbed the pitch and crossed the goal on a 30 yard play. However, the score was nullified by a clipping penalty. Now facing third and ten, DeWitt again passed to Carlson, this time for just inches short of the first down. Kevin Wand grabbed the first down by inches on a quarterback sneak. Jack DeWitt threw to Wand for a loss of six yards. Second down featured an incomplete pass. With third and 15, Wand threw to Linduska for 11 yards. Jack DeWitt took the ball from the 25 to the 19 for the first down. After an incomplete pass, Carlson ran to the eight to give the Rams first and goal. Jack DeWitt followed Carlson's run with a seven yard jaunt of his own. With 5:38 left in the first period, Jim Faaborg dove from the one yard line for the Rams' first score. DeWitt threw to Carlson for the extra point.

Jefferson kicked and Sac City grabbed two first downs before being forced to kick. The Rams were on their own 37 with first and ten. DeWitt carried for four yards, followed by Jim Faaborg with an eight yard boost and another first down. With first and ten on the Ram 49, the first quarter ended. Opening the second stanza, Carlson carried eight yards. Dan Turner bellowed 13 yards for a first down on the Sac City 30. Following a three yard run by Turner, Kevin Wand was thrown for a seven yard loss. Facing fourth and 14, an incomplete pass was thrown; giving Sac City possession on their own 34. Sac City completed four plays and Jefferson regained possession, on the Ram 35.

Jack DeWitt was thrown for a loss of one on the opening play, but carried six yards on the following play. After an incomplete pass on third down, Jefferson punted. Downfield, the ball was

jarred loose and John Shanda recovered to give the Rams first and ten on the Sac 40. DeWitt carried six yards then threw 16 yards to Dave Carlson. Dan Turner took the line of scrimmage to the nine on first down and followed by scoring on a nine yard jaunt. Dave Lehman kicked the conversion.

With 3:52 left in the first half, Sac City took possession on the Jefferson 38. Soon facing fourth and eight, the Indians punted and Jefferson took over on the 36. Dan Turner then carried the Rams downfield with runs of 13, four, three and five yards. Then after an incomplete pass, Jim Faaborg picked off an eleven yard throw from Kevin Wand. DeWitt then threw to Linduska for first and ten on the 13. Jack DeWitt then threw to Steve Hastings, in the extreme corner of the end zone, who picked it out of the air to make the score 20-0 with :23 left in first half action.

Sac took the kickoff and started their second half "attack" on their own 15. After three plays and only five yards of headway, they punted and Jefferson took over on the 37. Dan Turner opened with a three yard gain. Carlson lost that yardage on second down and there was no gain on third down. Linduska then kicked and the 32 yard punt rolled out of bounds on the five. Sac City ran three plays before facing fourth and about a foot. The Indians went into punt formation and Steve McPherson penetrated the line and blocked the punt. Unable to reach the ball before rolling out of the end zone, the Rams had to settle for a safety.

Sac City then got a free kick from the 20 and Jefferson took possession on their own 44. Turner carried for four yards followed by a two yard drive by Jim Faaborg. Kevin Wand then threw seven yards to Steve Linduska and then grabbed nine more yards on a quarterback sneak. Turner reached the first down on a three yard carry. The Rams lost yardage on the next couple of plays and Sac City took over on their own 36 as the

Sac passed and Jack DeWitt intercepted to regain possession for the Rams. A clipping penalty halted the runback. Jefferson scored on the first play of the series as Jack DeWitt combined with Dave Carlson on a 30 yard touchdown play. Dave Lehman kicked the PAT and the score was 29-0 with 10:06 remaining.

Sac City took over on their own 27. On first down Phil Kennedy threw the Indians for a seven yard loss. Another loss followed which set the Indians further into their own territory. They kicked and Jefferson took over on the Sac City 28. The Indians were off side on the opening play, giving Jefferson first and five on the 23. After two incomplete passes the Rams moved to first and goal on the ten as Kevin Wand threw to Steve Linduska. On first down, Kevin Wand was thrown for a seven yard loss. Faaborg regained five of the seven yards on second down. Third down featured Wand on a six yard keeper. With fourth down, Jefferson gained only four of the needed six yards and Sac City took over on the two. Phil Lautner and Bob Zeller broke through the line and scored the second safety of the game as they captured Alan Wiley in the end zone.

Jefferson took the kick on the Indians' 45. Turner went to the 38. The substitutes came in and gained two yards. Then, with a yard needed, the seniors came in. Center Phil Kennedy grabbed the first down with a six yard gain. On first down, Kennedy moved to quarterback and made five yards on a keeper. Jefferson then fumbled, Sac City

took over and the game ended.

And a glorious victory it was; had not Audubon dumped Denison the Rams would have been alone on top. 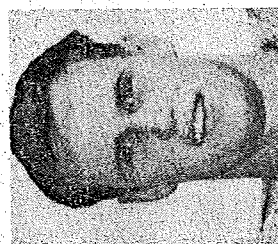

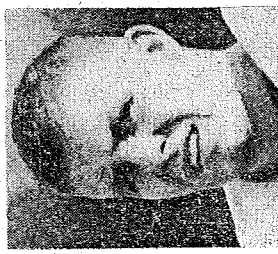

The three communities—represented by nine schools—control eight of the 11 first-team selections and have 23 representatives among the 77 players honored on the seven teams.

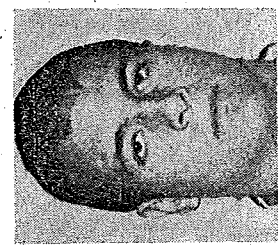

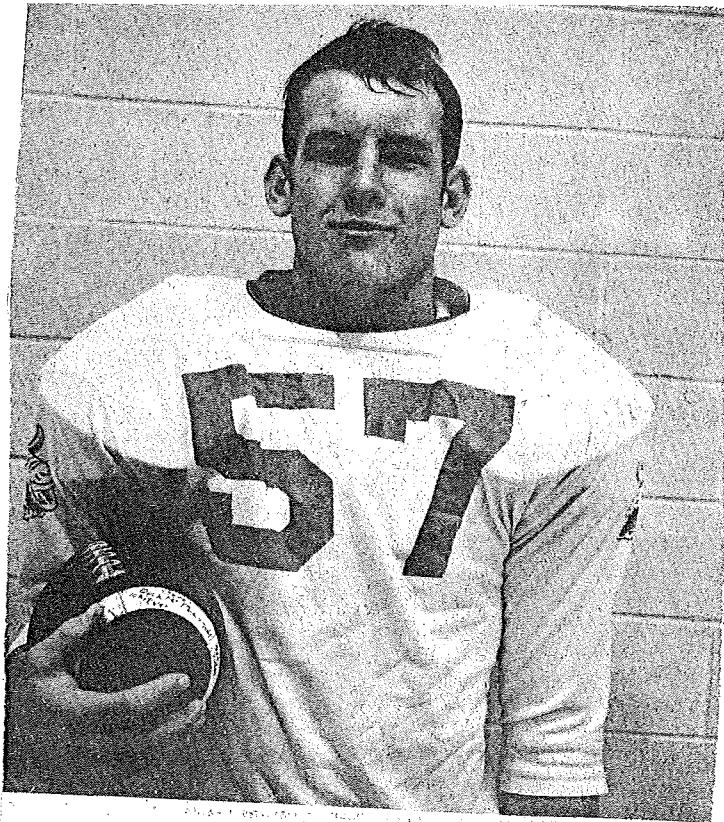

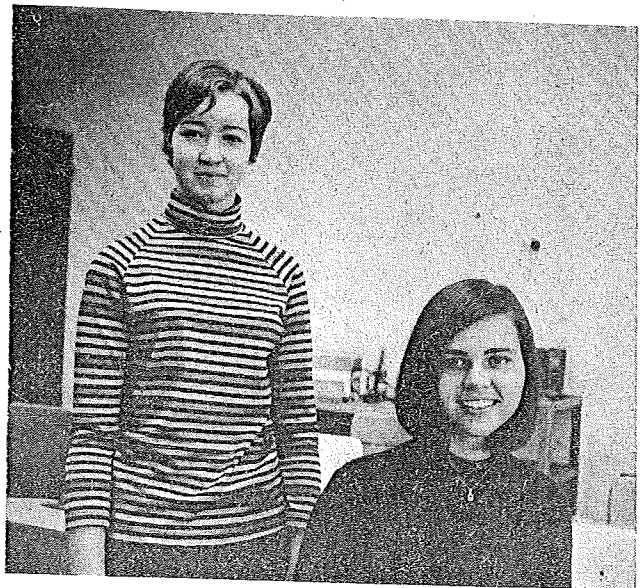
that she won't leave. She has taken care of it. We've been having a very predictable temperate in the school.

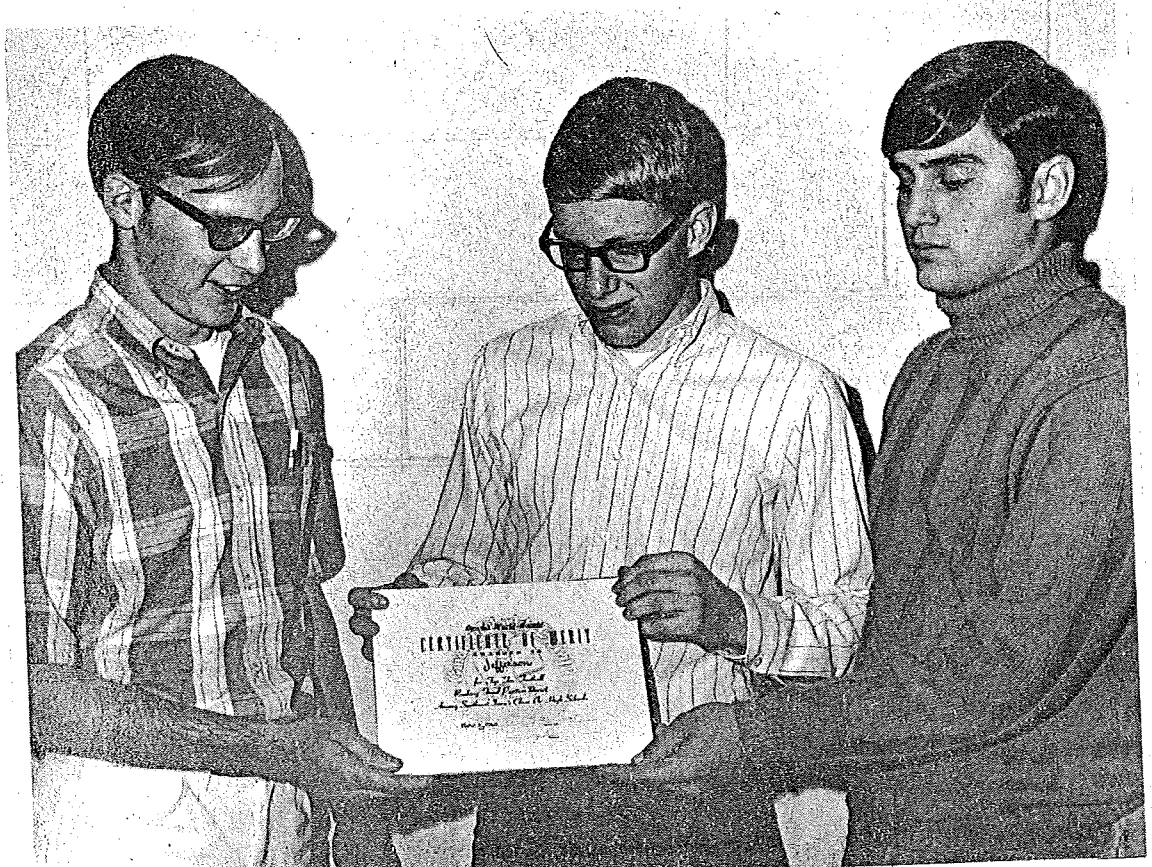
