It seems he wrote from a crystal ball and surely has been rolling in his grave for the ensuing decades.]

This great and amazing God-given revelation, the radio, in-doubtedly [sic] planned for man's edification and pleasure, should be given over to the "money changers" and devoted entirely to the business of separating the people from their cash. Personally, the writer doesn't give a tinker's darn if it is. It is what the people "have coming." The only addition we need to it is some sort of scheme whereby one's radio cannot be turned off. We need to have the noise perpetually, days and nights, holidays and Sundays, and have dinged in our ears through countless hours the prices of prunes, pepper, pig feed and poultry cure, hog-waterers, hash and heliotrope, auto tires, accessories and alligators, zebras, zeppelins and zippers.

Hurraw for commerce! Don't let anything interfere with selling something! What would it be like if we couldn't be "sold" now and then and all the time? Is there anything to life but making money, grabbing gold and pocketing profit?"
